

SB 1353, as it passed the Senate, in connection with prohibitions on investing in Sudan and thermal coal companies Public Employees' Retirement System and the State Teachers' Retirement System, required that a board of administration determination that fails certain actions to satisfy constitutional fiduciary responsibilities be subject to a recorded rollcall vote of the full board, following a presentation and discussion of findings, as specified.

The Assembly amendments, instead, clarify that specified state contributions, made pursuant to adjustments to state appropriations funding the Defined Benefit Program State Teachers' Retirement Plan, be allocated to reduce any unfunded actuarial obligation resulting from the benefits and contribution rates in effect as of July 1, 1990.

S.B. No. 443—Mitchell et al. An act relating to forfeiture.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 443, as it passed the Senate, made a variety of changes to asset forfeiture procedures, including, among other things, requiring property seized pursuant to any federal law that authorizes the sharing or transfer of forfeited property to be distributed according to state law, requiring the court to appoint counsel for the defendant in a forfeiture proceeding in specified circumstances, allowing recovery of attorney's fees for defendants or claimants who prevail in a forfeiture action, making specified changes to the distribution of forfeiture proceeds, and increasing the burden of proof that a law enforcement agency must meet to succeed in a forfeiture action with regards to cash or negotiable instruments of a value of not less than \$25,000.

The Assembly amendments remove the requirement to distribute property seized pursuant to any federal law that authorizes the sharing or transfer of forfeited property according to state law, the requirement to appoint counsel in specified circumstances, the allowance of recovery of attorney's fees described above, the specified changes to the distribution of forfeiture proceeds, and other related changes. The Assembly amendments additionally limit the increase to the burden of proof in forfeiture actions to cash or negotiable instruments of a value of less than \$40,000, and require the Legislative Analyst's Office to, on or before December 31, 2019, provide a report to the Legislature containing data about the economic impact of specified provisions on state and local law enforcement budgets.

S.B. No. 1242-Lara.

An act relating to sentencing.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 1242, as it passed the Senate, deemed, for all purposes, a person who was convicted of an offense punishable by imprisonment in a county jail for up to or not exceeding one year prior to the effective date of Chapter 174 of the Statutes of 2014 and who was sentenced to county jail for one year to have been sentenced to county jail for 364 days.

The Assembly amendments instead give retroactive effect to the provision that every offense punishable by imprisonment in a county jail up to or not exceeding one year is punishable by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not to exceed 364 days, whether or not the case was final on the effective date of that provision. The Assembly amendments also authorize a person who was sentenced to a term of one year prior to the effective date of that provision to file a motion before the trial court that entered the judgment of conviction in the case to have the term of the sentence modified to the maximum term of 364 days.

S.B. No. 253—Monning et al. An act relating to juveniles.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 253, as it passed the Senate, commencing July 1, 2016, required that an order authorizing the administration of psychotropic medications to a dependent child be granted only upon the court's determination that there is clear and convincing evidence that administration of the medication is in the best interest of the child, as specified. SB 253, as it passed the Senate, prohibited the court from authorizing the administration of psychotropic medications unless a 2nd independent medical opinion is obtained from a child psychiatrist or behavioral pediatrician. Among other things, SB 253 prohibited the court from authorizing the administration of a psychotropic medication unless the court is provided documentation that appropriate laboratory screenings and tests have been completed no more than 30 days prior to the submission of the request to the court.

The Assembly amendments, commencing January 1, 2018, additionally apply the provisions of the bill to delinquent children in foster care. The Assembly amendments delete the requirement that the court's determination be based on clear and convincing evidence. The Assembly amendments prohibit the court from authorizing the administration of psychotropic medications unless a preauthorization review is obtained from a child psychiatrist. Among other things, the Assembly amendments extend the 30-day period described above to 45 days.

SB 266, as it passed the Senate, authorized, until January 1, 2021, a court to impose flash incarceration, as defined, to detain an offender in a county jail for not more than 10 days for a violation of his or her conditions of probation or mandatory supervision.

The Assembly amendments add additional requirements on the imposition of flash incarceration, allow a person to receive credits earned for a period of flash incarceration if his or her probation or mandatory supervision is revoked, and make conforming changes.

S.B. No. 543-Wolk.

An act relating to veterans, and making an appropriation therefor.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 543, as it passed the Senate, established the MWR fund and required the administrator of a veterans' home to deposit money from that home's Morale, Welfare, and Recreation Fund into the MWR fund. The bill required the Department of Veterans Affairs to annually disburse money from the MWR fund to each veterans' home, and required the department to maintain a reserve in the MWR fund. The bill additionally required each home to establish a separate account for the purpose of receiving donations.

The Assembly amendments remove the requirement for each home to establish a separate account for the purpose of receiving donations, but requires each home to establish an MWRO account to receive disbursements from the MWR fund, and specifies how those funds may be spent. The amendments additionally require each home to establish an MWR committee to provide guidance on the budgeting and use of these funds, among other things. The amendments also require the department to maintain a larger reserve in the MWR fund.

An act relating to firearms.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 869, as it passed the Senate, required a person, when leaving a handgun in an unattended vehicle, to lock the handgun in the vehicle's trunk or lock the handgun in a locked container and place the container out of plain view, and made a violation of those requirements an offense.

The Assembly amendments, in addition, exempt from that offense and from the offense of carrying a concealed firearm in a vehicle, the transportation of an unloaded firearm by a person operating a licensed common carrier or an authorized agent or employee thereof when the firearm is transported in conformance with federal law.

An act relating to common interest developments.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 918, as it passed the Senate, required an owner of a separate interest in a common interest development to annually provide specified notice to the homeowners' association. The bill required the homeowners' association to enter the data received from the homeowners' notices into its books at least 30 days prior to the association making its own required disclosures under specified statutes. The bill, as it passed the Senate, require the owner of a separate interest to provide a mailing address as part of the notice and deemed the property address to be the mailing address if no mailing address was provided by the owner of the separate interest.

The Assembly amendments make technical changes and eliminate the reference to the "mailing address" for the notices, instead referring only to the "address" for purposes of the notice delivery.

S.B. No. 919—Hertzberg et al. An act relating to water supply.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 919, as it passed the Senate, required the Public Utilities Commission, in consultation with the Independent System Operator, to address the oversupply of renewable energy resources through a tariff or other economic incentives for the electricity purchased by customers operating "facilities that create or augment local water supplies," as defined, to reduce the cost of electricity to those facilities. SB 919, as it passed the Senate, gave examples of the types of economic incentives, including, among others, time-of-use, to address the oversupply. SB 919, as it passed the senate of the Legislature to expedite funding for projects that encourage the deployment of facilities that create or augment local water supplies and specified certain types of facilities.

The Assembly amendments add dynamic pricing, and change time-of-use pricing to time-variant rates, in the list of examples of economic incentives, and specify groundwater recharge facilities as projects for which funding should be expedited. The Assembly amendments revise the definition of the term "facilities that create or augment local water supplies" to include facilities for groundwater treatment and remediation activities. The Assembly amendments authorize the commission to consider implementing these requirements in an existing proceeding.

An act relating to pet boarding facilities.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 945, as it passed the Senate, among other things, established procedures for the care and maintenance of pets boarded at a pet boarding facility, including, but not limited to, sanitation, provision of enrichment devices, health of the pet, and safety, prohibited a person convicted of an offense related to the welfare of animals, as specified, from operating a pet boarding facility or from being employed as an employee of a pet boarding facility, and made a violation of its provisions an infraction punishable by a fine not to exceed \$250 for the first violation and not to exceed \$1,000 for each subsequent violation.

The Assembly amendments, among other things, delete the prohibition on a person convicted of an offense related to the welfare of animals from operating a pet boarding facility or from being employed as an employee of a pet boarding facility a; require a notice to correct to be issued by an animal control officer, a humane officer, or a peace officer and a chance to comply with the notice to be given prior to subjecting a pet boarding facility operator to an infraction for a violation of certain provisions, with exceptions; and provide that an operator that causes or allows harm or injury to an animal or allows an animal to be subject to an unreasonable risk of harm or injury is guilty of a misdemeanor.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 977, as it passed the Senate, prohibited the use of a tobacco product, as defined, within 250 feet of a youth sports event, as defined, and made a violation an infraction punishable by a fine of \$250 for each violation.

The Assembly amendments specify that this prohibition applies to a person located in the same park or facility where a youth sports event is taking place and delete the provision in existing law that exempts private property from smoking prohibitions within 25 feet of a playground or tot lot sandbox area. The Assembly amendments also make technical, nonsubstantive changes.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 1007, as it passed the Senate, established a right for a party to an arbitration to have a certified shorthand reporter transcribe any deposition, proceeding, or hearing. SB 1007 required the party requesting a certified shorthand reporter to make his or her request upon the initiation of the arbitration or at the time that any deposition, proceeding, or hearing is being calendared. SB 1007 authorized a party, if an arbitrator refuses to allow the party to have a certified shorthand reporter transcribe the deposition, proceeding, or hearing, to petition the court for an order compel the arbitrator to grant the party's request.

The Assembly amendments provide that the party requesting a certified shorthand reporter shall make that request in or at a demand for arbitration; a response, answer, or counterclaim to a demand for arbitration; or a pre-hearing scheduling conference at which a deposition, proceeding, or hearing is being calendared. The Assembly amendments also provide that a party petitioning the court to compel an arbitrator to grant a request to have a certified shorthand reporter transcribe a deposition, proceeding, or hearing may include a request for an order to stay any deposition, proceeding, or hearing related to the arbitration pending the court's determination of the petition.

SB 1029, as it passed the Senate, among other things, required a state or local public agency to submit an annual report for any issue of debt for which it has submitted a report of final sale on or after January 21, 2017, as provided, within specified time periods by any method approved by the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission. SB 1029 authorized the commission to develop an alternate reporting method in furtherance of the purpose of collecting the data required by the bill's provisions.

The Assembly amendments require that, before approving any alternate method of reporting, the commission consult with appropriate state and local debt issuers and organizations representing debt issuers to, among other things, make a proposed reporting method more efficient and less burdensome for issuers.

The Senate amendments delete the authorization for the City and County of San Francisco and the district to implement an automatic enforcement system to enforce parking violations occurring at bus stops.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 1060, as it passed the Senate, required a county placing agency, to the extent practicable, to convene a meeting with a dependent child or ward who was ordered to be placed for adoption, the sibling or siblings of the child, the prospective adoptive parent or parents, and a facilitator for the purpose of deciding whether to voluntarily execute a postadoption sibling contact agreement. SB 1060, as it passed the Senate, required a court, in an adoption proceeding for a dependent child, to inquire into the status of the development of such an agreement at the time of consideration of an adoption petition. SB 1060, as it passed the Senate, also imposed certain requirements on court orders relating to visiting arrangements with the siblings of a minor who was declared a ward and ordered to be placed in a permanent placement, as specified.

The Assembly amendments instead require the court to inquire into the status of the development of a voluntary postadoption sibling contact agreement at the first review conducted for the dependent child described above. The Assembly amendments authorize the county placing agency to comply with the requirement to convene a meeting by allowing a nonprofit organization, as specified, to facilitate a meeting and develop the agreement. The Assembly amendments exempt the county placing agency from the requirement to convene a meeting under specified circumstances. The Assembly amendments authorize the dependent child or ward to petition the court for an order requiring the county placing agency to convene a meeting. The Assembly amendments provide that attendance by a party at a meeting is not required under specified circumstances. The Assembly amendments make other conforming changes.

SB 1089, as it passed the Senate, expanded the composition of the Wildlife Conservation Board to include 2 public members to be appointed by an unspecified entity to serve terms of 4 years each and clarified that the Director of Finance, who serves on the board, may appoint a designee to serve on the board to represent the director.

The Assembly amendments expand the composition of the Wildlife Conservation Board to include 4 public members who meet certain qualifications to serve terms of 4 years each and require one public member to be appointed by the Speaker of the Assembly, one public member to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules, and 2 public members to be appointed by the Governor. The Assembly amendments also delete the provision clarifying that the Director of Finance may appoint a designee to serve on the board.

The Assembly amendments require this expansion of newborn screening to occur as soon as practicable, but no later than 2 years after a disease is adopted by the RUSP, or enrollment of this bill, whichever is later.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 1108, as it passed the Senate, authorized a county or city to establish a commission, composed of residents of the county or city, to either change the boundaries of the county board of supervisor districts or city council districts, as applicable, or recommend to the governing body changes to the boundaries of the districts. The bill required the commission to report to the governing body its findings on the need for changes to the boundaries and its adopted or recommended changes, as specified. The bill prohibited the appointment of a person or family member of a person who engaged in specified activities during the preceding 8 years and prohibited commission members from engaging in specified activities while serving and for a specified period of time after serving.

The Assembly amendments distinguish between an advisory redistricting commission, which is defined as a body that recommends placement of the district boundaries for a city council of a general law city or a county board of supervisors, and an independent redistricting commission, which is defined as a body, other than a legislative body, that is empowered to adopt the district boundaries. The amendments make the prohibition against appointing a person or family member who engaged in specified activities during the preceding 8 years and the prohibition against commission members engaging in specified activities applicable only to an independent redistricting commission.

SB 1129, as it passed the Senate, deleted specified sanctions imposed for engaging in prohibited acts relating to prostitution, including mandatory minimum terms of incarceration and provisions authorizing a court to suspend, for not more than 30 days, the privilege of a person to operate a motor vehicle if a defendant is convicted of one of specified disorderly conduct crimes and the crime was committed within 1,000 feet of a private residence and with the use of a private vehicle.

The Assembly amendments reinstate the authority of a court to suspend, for not more than 30 days, under the circumstances described above, the privilege of a person to operate a motor vehicle. The Assembly amendments also incorporate additional changes to Section 647 of the Penal Code, proposed by SB 420, SB 1322, and AB 1708.

SB 1135, as it passed the Senate, required a health care service plan contract or health insurance policy that is issued, renewed, or amended on or after January 1, 2017, to provide information to enrollees or insureds regarding the standards for timely access to health care services and other specified health care access information. The bill also required a health care service plan or health insurer to provide a contracting health care provider with a specified notice regarding the provision of referrals or health care services in a timely manner.

The Assembly amendments make these provisions only apply to a health care service plan contract or health insurance policy that is issued, renewed, or amended on or after July 1, 2017. The amendments also replace the specified notice regarding the provision of referrals or health care services in a timely manner with a general notice about that information. The amendments additionally allow a health care service plan or health insurer to deliver that notice by including the information with an existing communication with a contracting provider.

SB 1262 revised the definition of sufficient water supply for the purposes of the requirement that a city or county include as a condition in any tentative map that includes a subdivision that sufficient water supply be available and provided that groundwater from a probationary basin is not a water supply for these purposes.

The Assembly amendments eliminate the prohibition on groundwater from a probationary basin being a source of water for the purposes of a water supply assessment and for the purposes of sufficient water supply as a condition in any tentative map that includes a subdivision.

SB 1288, as it passed the Senate, authorized a district not formed for municipal purposes, general law city, or school district to conduct primary elections in a manner under which a candidate for nonpartisan office is elected at the primary election if he or she receives votes on the majority of all ballots cast at the primary election.

The Assembly amendments require a proposal to conduct elections in this manner to be approved by the voters of the district, city, or school district.

SB 1288, as it passed the Senate, authorized a city, county, or local educational agency to conduct an election using ranked choice voting, in which voters rank the candidates for office in order of preference. The bill provided that a county officer who is elected to a full term by ranked choice voting may only be elected in a general election held in November of an even-numbered year. The bill also required a jurisdiction that uses ranked choice voting, or that conducts a primary election in a manner under which a candidate who receives votes on the majority of all ballots is elected at the primary election, to conduct a voter education and outreach campaign.

The Assembly amendments provide that a city officer, county board of education member, or a member of the governing board of a school district or community college district who is elected to a full term by ranked choice voting may only be elected in a general election held in November of an even-numbered year. The Assembly amendments specify particular requirements for conducting the voter education and outreach campaign.

SB 1340, as it passed the Senate, added to the model water landscape ordinance a provision requiring, on or after July 1, 2018, a permit for the installation, replacement, or expansion, as specified, of an automatic irrigation system for a landscape project if the irrigation system serves either a residential landscape of 10,000 square feet or greater or a nonresidential landscape that is not a cemetery. SB 1340, as it passed the Senate, allowed the governing body of a local agency to adopt an ordinance prescribing fees for filing an application for the permit, subject to the restrictions that the fees not exceed the amount reasonably required to review applications and issue the permits and that the fees not be levied for general revenue purposes.

The Assembly amendments remove the permit requirement from the model water landscape ordinance and instead require, on or after July 1, 2018, a local agency to require a permit for the installation or expansion of an automatic irrigation system for a landscape project if the irrigation system serves either a residential landscape of 10,000 square feet or greater or a nonresidential landscape that is not a cemetery and that is 2,500 square feet or greater. The Assembly amendments exempt from these requirements the repair and replacement of the components or parts of an automatic irrigation system. The Assembly amendments additionally authorize a property owner, property manager, landscape contractor, landscape architect, or any other agent designated by the property owner to submit the application for a permit required for an irrigation system serving a residential landscape.

The Assembly amendments require state agencies to implement this requirement in conjunction with the state's other strategies to meet its greenhouse gas emissions reduction goals and with the intent to, among other things, promote the cooperation of owners of natural and working lands. The Assembly amendments specify that these provisions do not affect the existing authority of a city, county, city and county, state agency, department, commission, or board relating to natural and working lands.

The Assembly amendments prohibit the University of California, the California State University, or a community college district from asking an applicant to disclose, orally or in writing, information concerning any final administrative decision or final judicial decision described above, including any inquiry about an applicable decision on any employment application, until it has determined that the applicant meets the minimum employment gualifications stated in the notice issued for the position. The Assembly amendments also add coauthors.

SB 247, as it passed the Senate, required a charter-party carrier of passengers engaged in charter bus transportation, as specified, to be equipped with safety equipment, including burn resistant materials for occupant compartments, emergency lighting fixtures, luminescent or reflective emergency signage, an event data recorder, and windows that can be easily opened and remain open during an emergency. SB 247, as it passed the Senate, required vehicles covered by the bill manufactured that are on or after July 1, 2017, to also be equipped with a secondary exit door. SB 247 required the charter-party carrier to ensure that the driver of the vehicle instruct the passengers regarding the safety equipment and emergency exits on the vehicle. SB 247, as it passed the Senate, required the Department of the California Highway Patrol to adopt standards and criteria for implementation of the safety equipment requirements by July 1, 2017.

The Assembly amendments delete the requirements relating to burn resistant materials, emergency signage, event data recorders, and windows. The Assembly amendments allow for the passenger safety instructions described above to be made by video. The Assembly amendments limit application of the bill to vehicles designed to carry 39 or more passengers and that are manufactured on or after July 1, 2020, and specify that a vehicle covered by the bill shall at all times meet applicable federal motor vehicle safety standards. The Assembly amendments extend the deadline for adoption of implementing standards and criteria by the department to July 1, 2018.

The Assembly amendments establish within the Office of Emergency Services the California Earthquake Early Warning Program and the California Earthquake Early Warning Advisory Board to support development of the statewide earthquake early warning system.

SB 908, as it passed the Senate, required, if the Department of Managed Health Care or the Department of Insurance, respectively, determines that a group rate is unreasonable or not justified, the contractholder or policyholder to be notified by the health care service plan or health insurer in writing of that determination, and would require the contractholder or policyholder to be given 60 days to obtain other health coverage from the existing coverage provider or another provider. With respect to small group plan contracts or policies offered through the Exchange, SB 908 exempted these circumstances from the requirement that a health care service plan or health insurer limit enrollment in a small group health care service plan contract or health insurance policy to specified open, annual, or special enrollment periods. SB 908 required, if the respective department determines that an individual rate is unreasonable or not justified, the contractholder or policyholder to be notified by the health care service plan or health insurer in writing of that determination, and would require, if the open enrollment period has closed for the applicable rate year or there are fewer than 60 days remaining in the open enrollment period for the applicable rate year, the contractholder or policyholder to be given 60 days to obtain other coverage from the existing coverage provider or another provider. During the 60-day period the contractholder or policyholder would continue to be covered at the prior rate. SB 908 provided that this notification provided to the contractholder or policyholder constitutes a triggering event for purposes of special enrollment periods in the individual market if the open enrollment period has closed for the applicable rate year or there are fewer than 60 days remaining in the open enrollment period for the applicable rate year. SB 908 also revised obsolete references and made other technical, nonsubstantive changes.

The Assembly amendments instead limit the group market notification requirement to products in the small group market and require, if the respective department determines that a plan's or health insurer's rate increase for an individual or small group market product is unreasonable or not justified, the plan or health insurer to provide notice of that determination to any individual or small group applicant. The Assembly amendments delete the requirement that the notification provided to the contractholder or policyholder constitutes a triggering event for purposes of special enrollment periods in the individual and small group markets. The Assembly amendments require the notification provided to individual and small group

contractholders and policyholders to be developed by the respective departments. The Assembly amendments, among other things, require, for grandfathered individual and grandfathered and nongrandfathered small group health care service plan contracts or health insurance policies, a health care service plan or health insurer in the individual or small group market to file rate information at least 120 days prior to implementing any rate change and require, for nongrandfathered individual health care service plan contracts or health insurance policies, a plan or health insurer to file rate information either 100 days before the first day of the applicable enrollment period for the preceding policy year or on the date specified in federal guidance issued pursuant to a specified federal regulation, whichever date is earlier.

SB 950, as it passed the Senate, enacted the Excluded Employee Arbitration Act, which established a procedure for the resolution of certain grievances by excluded employees, as provided. SB 950, as it passed the Senate, deemed a request for arbitration withdrawn if an employee organization did not submit its choice of arbitrator within 45 days. SB 950, as it passed the Senate, required the arbitrator to issue a decision for each grievance.

The Assembly amendments specify that the withdrawal of an arbitration request would not prevent the employee from pursuing other grievance procedures available by law. The Assembly amendments specifically require the arbitrator to apply California law to the facts in reaching a decision. The Assembly amendments also grant a party to the arbitration the right to have a certified shorthand reporter transcribe the proceeding, provide that the transcript constitutes the official record of the proceeding, and make related changes.

SB 1004, as it passed the Senate, authorized the Counties of Alameda, Butte, Napa, Nevada, and Santa Clara to establish a transitional youth diversion pilot program for defendants who are 18 years of age or older, but under 21 years of age on the date the offense was committed and who meet other eligibility criteria. The bill required a county that established a pilot program pursuant to these provisions to conduct an evaluation of the pilot program, as specified.

The Assembly amendments authorize those counties to establish a pilot program to instead operate a deferred entry of judgment pilot program for eligible defendants. The Assembly amendments also require a county that establishes a pilot program pursuant to these provisions to submit data regarding the pilot program to the Board of State and Community Corrections. The Assembly amendments require the board, rather than the county, to conduct the evaluation, expand the scope of the evaluation, and require the evaluation to be combined into a comprehensive report and submitted to the Assembly and Senate Committees on Public Safety. The Assembly amendments also authorize the board to contract with an independent entity, including, but not limited to, the Regents of the University of California, to carry out these duties.

The Assembly amendments additionally require the commission, in its review of applications for grants and loans to publicly supported communities to finance projects to connect to broadband networks funded through the Broadband Public Housing Account within the CASF, to award grants only to unserved housing developments, as defined. The Assembly amendments postpone from December 31, 2016, to December 31, 2020, the date by which moneys in the Broadband Public Housing Account, that were transferred to that account from other accounts within the CASF, can be expended for its purposes and postpone until that date the transfer of any unexpended moneys remaining in that account back to the accounts from which they were originally transferred. The Assembly amendments expand existing annual reporting requirements of the commission with respect to the CASF to require that each report include information on expenditures by county, details on efforts to leverage non-CASF funds, the status of each project funded through the CASF, whether the project has been completed, and, if applicable, the expected completion date of the project.

SB 1072, as it passed the Senate, required the governing board of a school district to require that any contract for the transportation of pupils include the requirement that a pupil shall not be left unattended on a schoolbus, school pupil activity bus, or youth bus, as provided. SB 1072, as it passed the Senate, required that the classroom instruction required to be completed by applicants seeking to renew a certificate to drive a schoolbus or a school pupil activity bus also cover inspection procedures to ensure pupils are not left unattended on a schoolbus or school pupil activity bus. SB 1072, as it passed the Senate, required certain school officials to notify the Department of Motor Vehicles when a driver of schoolbus, school pupil activity bus, or youth bus has left a pupil unattended onboard, and authorized the department to refuse to issue or renew, and to revoke or suspend, a bus driver certificate on these grounds. SB 1072, as it passed the Senate, required, on or before the beginning of the 2018–19 school year, schoolbuses, school pupil activity buses, and youth buses to be equipped with a "child safety alarm system," which is a device located at the interior rear of a vehicle that requires the driver to manually contact the device before exiting the vehicle, thereby prompting the driver to inspect the entirety of the interior of the vehicle before exiting.

The Assembly amendments revise the procedures that certain school officials are required to follow before they notify the department that a driver of schoolbus, school pupil activity bus, or youth bus has left a pupil unattended onboard. The Assembly amendments permit a former applicant or holder of a bus driver certificate whose certificate was revoked on those grounds to reapply for a certificate if the certificate revocation is reversed or dismissed by the department. The Assembly amendments require the transportation safety plan to also include procedures and standards for designating an adult chaperone, other than the driver, to accompany pupils on a school pupil activity bus, and require a charter school to prepare this plan. The Assembly amendments change the name "child safety alarm system" to "child safety alert system," revise the requirements for that system, and require child care motor vehicles, as defined, to be equipped with that system. The Assembly amendments provide that a school pupil activity bus is not required to be equipped

The Assembly amendments instead authorize a local housing authority to purchase and rehabilitate surplus residential property and require the local housing authority to dedicate profits realized from a subsequent sale to the construction of affordable housing in Pasadena, South Pasadena, Alhambra, La Cañada Flintridge, and the 90032 postal ZIP Code. The Assembly amendments establish the Affordable Housing Trust Account within the Housing Finance Fund to receive the net proceeds from a subsequent market sale, as specified, and continuously appropriate these moneys to the California Housing Finance Agency for specified activities within the area described above. The Assembly amendments also specifically require the Department of Transportation to deposit proceeds from the sale of surplus residential property from the department to a new owner in the SR-710 Rehabilitation Account. The Assembly amendments make findings regarding the need for a special statute and declare that the bill would take effect immediately as an urgency statute.

SB 702, as it passed the Senate, was entitled the "County of Lake Teen Employment and Training Act" and extended the operation of specified exceptions to the Labor Code from January 1, 2017, until January 1, 2027, to permit minors employed in agricultural packing plants in the County of Lake to work up to 10 hours a day during peak harvesting season when school is not in session. The bill also required the Labor Commissioner to report to the Legislature on or before November 1, 2025, on the working conditions for the minors for the period October 1, 2016, to October 1, 2025, inclusive.

The Assembly amendments remove the title of the act and instead extend the operation of the exemptions for minors in the County of Lake only until January 1, 2022. The Assembly amendments change the deadline for the Labor Commissioner to report to the Legislature from November 1, 2025, to November 1, 2020, to cover the period between October 1, 2016, and October 1, 2020. SB 884, as it passed the Senate, required each special education local plan area to require each local educational agency to provide certain information to parents, including information regarding family empowerment centers and parent training and information centers. SB 884, as it passed the Senate, required a special education local plan area to document and report to the State Department of Education funding allocations and expenditures for all mental health and special education services, and required the department to post the information on the department's Internet Web site. SB 884, as it passed the Senate, required a local educational agency responsible for a pupil's IEP to annually report to the department the actual frequency and duration of mental health services provided and other data needed to document pupil outcomes on 6 outcome indicators, as specified. SB 884, as it passed the Senate, required the department to monitor the mental health services reported annually by local educational agencies and to review and require corrections to each local educational agency's procedures and documents.

The Assembly amendments delete the contents of the bill and instead require the audit guide, for which specified entities are required to propose the content of for purposes of carrying out financial and compliance audits for local educational agencies, to include audit procedures to review whether specified funding, which the bill would subject to existing state and federal audit requirements, for educationally related mental health services required by an IEP received by local educational agencies was used for its intended purpose in the 2016–17 fiscal year. The Assembly amendments require these audit procedures to be included in future fiscal years if recommended by the Controller, as specified. The Assembly amendments require the State Department of Education to include a link on the sample procedural safeguards maintained on its Internet Web site to the page on its Internet Web site that lists family empowerment centers and to include the link on specified forms. The Assembly amendments require the department to submit 2 reports, as specified, relating to the provision of mental health services to pupils through an IEP to the

SB 996, as it passed the Senate, also required any outstanding qualified ad valorem tax in excess of the \$20,000 limitation, and related interest or penalty, which was levied or imposed on and after January 1, 2013, and before January 1, 2017, with respect to qualified property for which a qualified claim was filed, to be canceled, and any such qualified ad valorem tax, and related interest or penalty levied or imposed that was paid on or before January 1, 2017, to be refunded, to the extent that the amount canceled or refunded does not result in a total exemption amount in excess of \$100,000 of tax being allowed to a qualified taxpayer with respect to a single property or multiple properties for any fiscal year. SB 996, as it passed the Senate, on and after January 1, 2017, prohibited an escape assessment from being levied on qualified property if that amount would be subject to cancellation or refund pursuant to the bill.

The Assembly amendments eliminate the requirement that a refund be made under the circumstances described above and eliminate the prohibition on an escape assessment being levied on qualified property if that amount would be subject to refund.

SB 1040, as it passed the Senate, required the State Department of Social Services, in consultation with specified individuals and entities, to establish a working group to, among other things, review the challenges facing families with adopted and special needs children and make recommendations to the Legislature as to the services that may be helpful to these families. SB 1040, as it passed the Senate, required the working group to meet no later than June 1, 2017, and required the working group's recommendations to be submitted in a report to the appropriate policy committees of the Legislature on or before June 1, 2018.

The Assembly amendments delete the above-described provisions authorizing and regulating rehoming. The Assembly amendments also delete references to rehoming and special needs children from the purpose of the working group and instead specify that the working group shall be established to, among other things, review the challenges facing families with adopted children, in order to address and prevent the circumstances in which an adoptive parent seeks to engage in the unlawful transfer of the custody of a child.

The Assembly amendments expand the above-described list of individuals and entities the department is required to consult with. The Assembly amendments also expand the list of items to be considered by the working group in developing the recommendations, to include, among other additional items, specified data relating to postadoption instability, as defined, and an assessment of any gaps or limitations in existing law relating to the solicitation to take custody of a minor and the subsequent taking of custody of the minor without initiating a lawful guardianship proceeding or adoption proceeding.

The Assembly amendments require the working group to meet instead no later than April 1, 2017, and require the report to be submitted instead on or before April 1, 2018. The Assembly amendments also make technical changes to the Legislature's findings and declarations.

SB 1113, as it passed the Senate, authorized a county and a local educational agency (LEA) to enter into a partnership that includes, among other things, a requirement that the LEA participates in the above-mentioned performance outcome system and a requirement that the LEA reports certain information to another specified performance outcome system. SB 1113, as it passed the Senate, required, to the extent there is an appropriation in the annual Budget Act, the Superintendent of Public Instruction to allocate funds from that appropriation to the County and Local Educational Agency Partnership Fund, which was created in the bill.

The Assembly amendments, among other things, delete the requirement for the State Department of Education to expand its specified reporting system for mental health services. The Assembly amendments additionally authorize a qualified provider operating as part of the county mental health plan network to enter into a partnership with an LEA and delete the above-mentioned performance outcome system participation and reporting requirements. The Assembly amendments instead require the allocation of funds by the Superintendent of Public Instruction to the extent there is an appropriation in the annual Budget Act or another measure and also make related findings and declarations.
