Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 1443, as it passed the Senate among other things, prohibited an elected state officer, elected officer of a local government agency, or other designated individuals from accepting gifts from a single source in a calendar year with a total value of more than \$200 and authorized the Fair Political Practices Commission to increase the gift limitation amount each odd-numbered year based upon changes in the Consumer Price Index. The bill prohibited a lobbyist or lobbying firm from making a gift of any amount to these individuals.

The Assembly amendments reduce to \$200 the aggregate value of gifts that create a financial interest for a public official in the gift's donor for purposes of the prohibition against a public official making, participating in making, or in any way attempting to use the official's position to influence a governmental decision in which the official knows or has reason to know that he or she has a financial interest. The amendments also require the Commission to adjust the gift value amount to equal the above-described limitation amount on the value of gifts from a single source in a calendar year.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

Senate Bill 133, as it passed the Senate, prohibited a proposed enterprise zone from exceeding a specified aggregate size for applications for an enterprise zone designation submitted on or after January 1, 2014, if any portion of the proposed zone is within, or was previously within, the boundaries of a previously designated zone, or if any portions of the proposed zone are within, or previously were within, the boundaries of 2 or more previously designated enterprise zones.

The Assembly amendments delete this provision and instead, among other things, require a redevelopment agency under the Community Redevelopment Law to include specified additional information relating to any major audit violations, as defined, any corrections to those violations, and planning and general administrative expenses of the Low and Moderate Income Housing Fund. The amendments authorize the Controller to conduct quality control reviews of independent financial audit reports and publish the results of his or her reviews. The amendments also require the Department of Housing and Community Development to conduct audits of redevelopment agencies to ensure compliance with the housing provisions of the Community Redevelopment Law and require each agency to annually deposit 0.05% of any tax increment deposited into the Low and Moderate Income Housing Fund into the Redevelopment Agency Accountability Fund, a newly created fund, to fund the department audits.

The Assembly amendments also revise the costs and expenses which may be considered planning and general administrative costs for the purposes of being paid from the Low and Moderate Income Housing Fund. Except as provided, the amendments prohibit an agency from expending more than 15% of the tax increment deposited in the fund for planning and general administrative costs. The amendments impose other reporting and accountability measures on agencies with respect to the use of moneys in the fund for planning and administrative purposes.

The Assembly amendments require that at least 75% of an agency's expenditures from the Low and Moderate Income Housing Fund directly assist the new construction, acquisition and substantial rehabilitation, or preservation of housing for persons of extremely low, very low, low, or moderate income, with at least 25% of the expenditures required to be directed towards housing for persons of extremely low income and at least 50% of the expenditures required to be directed towards housing for persons of very low income.

The Assembly amendments delete the requirement that specified moneys in the Low and Moderate Income Housing Fund be offered to the housing authority that operates within the jurisdiction of the agency, as specified. The amendments also delete the provisions requiring an agency that has failed to expend or encumber excess surplus in the Low and Moderate Income Housing Fund within one year to

disburse the surplus voluntarily to the appropriate county housing authority or another public agency or to expend or encumber the surplus within 2 additional years and modify the definition of the term “excess surplus.”

The Assembly amendments modify an agency’s obligation to provide replacement housing to low- or moderate-income persons and families whenever low- or moderate-income housing dwelling units are destroyed or removed from the low- and moderate-income housing market under specified circumstances, and impose new requirements on an agency with respect to the replacement housing plan and housing specifications.
