SB 226, as it passed the Senate, established special procedures for courts to use in determining rights to groundwater within the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act, including procedures for, among other things, serving notice to unknown parties, providing initial disclosure of discoverable information, and intervention by the Department of Water Resources and the Department of Fish and Wildlife.

The Assembly amendments make this bill's operation contingent on the enactment of AB 1390. The Assembly amendments delete the above-described procedures and instead authorize the state to intervene in comprehensive adjudications, as described in AB 1390, and contain various provisions to make comprehensive groundwater adjudications consistent with the provisions of the act, including the achievement of sustainable groundwater management.

The Assembly amendments require the administrator, by January 1, 2017, to submit to the Legislature a report assessing the best achievable technology of equipment for oil spill prevention, preparedness, and response and to update regulations governing the adequacy of oil spill contingency plans before July 1, 2018. The Assembly amendments require the administrator, if oil spill dispersants are used in response to an oil spill, to provide to the Legislature a written notification of, and a written justification for, the use of the dispersants and a report on the effectiveness of the dispersants used. The Assembly amendments require the Oil Spill Technical Advisory Committee to convene a taskforce to evaluate the feasibility of using vessels of opportunity for oil spill response. The Assembly amendments also revise the penalties imposed on persons who cause or permit an oil spill.

SB 137, as it passed the Senate, required health care service plans and insurers subject to regulation by the Insurance Commissioner for services at alternative rates to make a provider directory available on its Internet Web site and to update the directory weekly and required the Department of Managed Health Care and the Department of Insurance to develop provider directory standards.

The Assembly amendments, commencing July 1, 2016, require the provider directory to be made available, as specified, require a health care service plan or health insurer to take appropriate steps to ensure the accuracy of the information contained in the plan or health insurer's directory or directories, and require the plan or health insurer, at least annually, to review and update the entire provider directory or directories for each product offered, as specified. The Assembly amendments also authorize a plan or health insurer to delay payment or reimbursement owed to a provider or provider group, as specified, if the provider or provider group fails to respond to the plan's or health insurer's attempts to verify the provider or provider group's information.

SB 321, as it passed the Senate, for the 2015–16 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, required the State Board of Equalization, on or before July 1, 2015, or March 1 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the applicable fiscal year, as specified, to adjust the motor vehicle fuel tax rate imposed pursuant to the Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax Law in a manner as to generate an amount of revenue equal to the amount of revenue loss attributable to a specified sales and use tax exemption on motor vehicle fuel based on estimates made by the board that reflect the combined average of the actual fuel price over the previous 4 fiscal years and the estimated fuel price for the current fiscal year, as specified. SB 321, as it passed the Senate, authorized the board, if due to specified economic changes the board makes a determination that the amount of revenue being generated by the motor vehicle fuel tax will be significantly different than those estimates made by the board, to adjust the rate more frequently than annually, but no more frequently than every 6 months in order to reduce the potential volatility of the revenues.

The Assembly amendments instead require the board to make the above-referenced adjustment to the motor vehicle fuel tax rate on March 1 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the applicable fiscal year for the 2016–17 fiscal year and each year thereafter. The Assembly amendments also delete the provision authorizing the board to adjust that rate more frequently than annually.

SB 507, as it passed the Senate, required the court in a civil commitment proceeding involving a person determined to be a sexually violent predator to issue a subpoena, upon the request of either party, for a copy of the medical and psychological records reviewed by a psychiatrist or psychologist performing an updated evaluation of the person. SB 507 authorized either party to move to quash the subpoena on the ground that the record is not likely to lead to the discovery of admissible evidence, and prohibited the attorney petitioning for commitment from providing access to these records to any 3rd party, including an expert retained by that attorney, without the consent of the court upon noticed motion.

The Assembly amendments delete the provisions regarding quashing a subpoena and instead specify that the provisions requiring a court to issue a subpoena do not affect the right of a party to object to the introduction at trial of a subpoenaed record on the ground that it is not material to the issue of whether the person is a sexually violent predator or to any other issue to be decided by the court.

SB 546, as it passed the Senate, required the Department of Managed Health Care and the Department of Insurance, as applicable, with respect to health care service plans and health insurers that offer coverage in the large group market, to conduct annual public meetings regarding large group rate changes, between November 1 and March 1 of each year, after reviewing information provided by the health care service plans and insurers regarding the amount of each rate change, the changes aggregated for the large group market, and other aggregate rate filing information. SB 546 required each respective department to review the provided information and finalize a decision as to whether the proposed rate is reasonable or unreasonable within 60 days after receiving the information.

The Assembly amendments delete the requirement that the department decide whether the proposed rate is reasonable or unreasonable. The Assembly amendments require each health care service plan and health insurer, for large group health care service plan contracts and insurance policies, to file with the appropriate department the weighted average rate increase for all large group benefit designs during the 12-month period ending January 1 of the following calendar year, as specified.

The Assembly amendments revise the bill’s meeting provisions, to require the annual meeting regarding large group rates to be conducted within 3 months of posting the aggregate information and delete the previously specified date ranges.

SB 610 required the department to finalize the per-visit reimbursement rate for a new FQHC or RHC that has made a one-time election for the department to establish its reimbursement rate based on the FQHC's or RHC's projected costs within 90 days after the FQHC or RHC submits an actual cost report from the first 12 months of its operation. SB 610 required the department to finalize a per-visit reimbursement rate based on a change in the scope of services for a new or relocated FQHC or RHC that elects to have its rate based on the rates of similarly situated FQHCs and RHCs within 90 days after the department receives a scope-of-service rate change request that the department determines to be comparable. SB 610 required the department to complete a final review of an annual reconciliation to reasonable cost, for the purposes of a program to ensure that total payments to FQHCs and RHCs operating as managed care sub-contractors comply with federal law, within 15 months after the last date of the fiscal year for which the department is conducting the review.

The Assembly amendments extend the time for the department to finalize the per-visit reimbursement rates described above from 90 days to one year. The Assembly amendments extend the time for the department to complete the final review of the annual reconciliation described above from 15 months to 18 months.
